Operator: Good day and welcome to the UFC 114 Media Conference call. Today's conference is being recorded. For opening remarks and introductions, I'd like to turn the call over to UFC President, Dana White, please go ahead.

Dana White: Good morning everybody, thank you for calling in today. Obviously, we have Rampage Jackson and Rashad Evans on the line. Let's open this thing for questions. This is for UFC 114 at the MGM Grand Saturday May 29. Fire away.

Operator: And if you would like to signal for a question, that is star 1, ladies and gentlemen, that is star 1. And we'll go first to Sergio Non, USA Today.

Sergio Non: Yes, hi, thanks for taking the time today. I have a question for Rampage. I saw an interview you did with "Fighter's Only" magazine recently where you talked about how you were a little dissatisfied with UFC and I was wondering if you could go into that a bit and sort of talk about what's making you unhappy these days.

Rampage Jackson: There's a lot of things that make me unhappy you know what I'm saying? But I'm here to talk about my fight with Rashad. That's the only thing I'm focused on right now.

Sergio Non: All right. And a question for Dana, I don't know if you had a chance to see that interview. I was wondering what your reaction was when you saw that?

Dana White: Yes, I saw it. And I knew that was going to be the first question today. Listen, Rampage, is very opinionated. You know as far as I'm concerned, I feel we've been very fair with a lot of people you know. Me and my partners put a lot of hard work into this business and made a lot of people a lot of money.

You know from what I hear from – the A-team movie Rampage killed it. He did a great job and he's probably going to become a big star after this movie. I want a piece of his second film. I want a piece of it.

Sergio Non: Are you going to get a piece of it?

Dana White: No. I'm kidding.

Sergio Non: Just wondering. All right. And a question for Rashad you know given that Rampage has been out for a little while, do you think you might have an edge just from having fought more recently?

Rashad Evans: You know I would like to think so but at the same time I'm not going (into the fight) thinking that he's going to be less than what he was. You know I'm going in there thinking I'm ((inaudible)).

Sergio Non: I'm sorry, can you say that again. I think you were breaking up a little bit.

Dana White: Yes, speak up a little, Rashad, speak up, talk a little louder.

Rashad Evans: I said I'm not going to be under estimating him you know what I'm saying. I think I'm probably going to be fighting the best Quinton I ever fought.

Sergio Non: All right. Great. I appreciate it. Thanks, guys.

Operator: And we'll go next to Franklin McNeil, ESPN.com.

Franklin McNeil: Yes, my question is for Rampage being that you've been out a while sometimes that can be a detriment but it can also be advantageous with the time off. Do you feel that having been off for a while doing something different from mixed martial arts can benefit you heading into this fight?

Rampage Jackson: First of all, what you all using the big words like that? I don't know what the hell you're talking about.

Franklin McNeil: You know me man.

Rampage Jackson: I'm going to use context clues here. Yes, me taking time off was – proved to be pretty good for my body because it's no secret that I sustained a lot of injuries because I fought a couple of fights back-to-back you know what I'm saying and my body was kind of worn out from that.

And it took time off and this camp it went you know what I'm saying perfect you know what I'm saying and my body you know what I'm saying is doing really good and I could train harder. And so you know everybody know I hurt my jaw like a week before the Wanderlei fight and I had to fight Jardine right afterwards with a hurt jaw. And now you know my jaw is doing really good and everything and I healed up perfectly. So I'm actually glad I took a little time off. I needed it.

Franklin McNeil: As far as being in the movie and all and now coming back to mixed martial arts, how important is it for you as far as your concentration on mixed martial arts? I mean are you able to separate the two and focus 100% or give 100% in camp and in training and all to mixed martial arts?

Rampage Jackson: Hey, I all ready forgot I did a damn movie. It got nothing to do with this fight you know what I'm saying. A fight is different from a movie. To me it's all work. It's all how I make a living you know what I'm saying. So the movie's been done with a long time ago and I've been training every since I got off the damn set. I don't even think about the movie no more. I'm thinking about this fight.

Franklin McNeil: And one last question about this fight, obviously, there's a lot of back and forth between you and Rashad. It seems very personal. Would this – how important would a victory – how would this victory – if you get this win how big will it be? Will it be – will it rank up there with winning the title or whatever because of all of the personal stuff that's involved?

Rampage Jackson: I don't know. It just – it would feel like (moral) victory for me you know what I'm seeing. You know Rashad he has no title. He couldn't even hold on to the belt you know what I'm saying after one fight. So it's like you know why am I even fighting this guy you know what I'm saying?

Then after I did the ultimate fighter now I know why I'm fighting this guy because I want to teach guys like this a lesson to keep his mouth shut when you ain't on the same level as the next man you know. So that's why – that's the motivation for this fight and it's like a (moral) victory. It's not up there with a title shot or no big accomplishment, no saying who is this guy?

You know he has done nothing compared to what I've done. I'm the first ever undisputed champion of my sport. So it's like fighting this guy is kind of like a step backwards but you know what I'm saying it would be a moral victory for me.

Franklin McNeil: OK. I won't even ask any more questions, I'll let other guys get on. Thanks guys.

Dana White: Thank you.

Operator: And we'll go next to Beau Dure, USA Today.

Beau Dure: Yes, Rashad when you weren't exchanging words with Rampage on the ultimate fighter you looked like you know you came across as a fairly cerebral guy. And apologies to Rampage for using another big word there. So what is it about Rampage that would sort of draw you away from you know that cerebral approach you had where you were thinking things through and being analytical to where you know you guys were kind of running ((inaudible)) each other.

Rashad Evans: I mean it's just the way he is you know what I'm saying. Just that last comment you know what I'm saying who am I to fight him? Motherfucker who is he to fight me? I beat Forrest. You didn't beat Forrest, bro. You lost. You almost got finished in the second round.

Rampage Jackson: I didn't even train for Forrest, bro. Keep talking about Forrest. Forrest ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: Hey, remember ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) and you talking about Forrest.

Rashad Evans: You almost got finished.

Rampage Jackson: Forrest ain't nobody.

Rashad Evans: So anyways, like I was saying...

Rampage Jackson: I trained my ass off for you boy.

Rashad Evans: Hey, hey, hey like I was saying, like I was saying just because you say ignorant stuff you know what I'm saying. And you perpetuate just stupidity.

Rampage Jackson: I beat Forrest.

Rashad Evans: Oh don't use no big words, I don't know what that is. Motherfucker, you're not stupid. Stop acting like you're stupid. Stop acting like just because you black you're stupid you know what I'm saying, I hate – I can't stand that attitude.

Beau Dure: All right, thanks.

Operator: And we'll go next to Neil Davidson, the Canadian Press.

Neil Davidson: Thank you. I wonder, obviously, the emotions are running high. Has there been any fighter that you've – any fight you've had before where you were so fired up about meeting this? Or is this a new high when it comes to bad blood? Maybe we start with you rampage.

Rampage Jackson: Man, I didn't even hear your question?

Neil Davidson: Have you fought anybody before that you disliked as much as Rashad?

Rampage Jackson: No.

Neil Davidson: And what makes him – what makes you so angry about him?

Rampage Jackson: I just don't like the way he talk to me. He's just real fake, and real cocky you know what I'm saying. For someone who really – he ain't really done much in this sport you know what I'm just saying I just don't...

Rashad Evans: Hey, I was the world champion, bro, the world champion and I got that belt...

Rampage Jackson: That belt, where your belt at.

Rashad Evans: From somebody that beat you.

Rampage Jackson: Where's your belt?

Rashad Evans: So I got the belt from somebody that beat you.

Rampage Jackson: I'm sorry but where's your belt.

Rashad Evans: So I was a world champion...

Rampage Jackson: Hey, ((inaudible)) didn't me, I beat myself.

Rashad Evans: I got the belt from the guy that beat you. So I mean what are you talking about?

Rampage Jackson: I'm glad you're going off there, man. I'm glad you're going off. Rashad, where's your belt.

Rashad Evans: You defended the belt one time and that fight was horrible.

Rampage Jackson: Where's your belt?

Rashad Evans: That fight was horrible.

Rampage Jackson: Your fight with Machida was horrible. You couldn't defend your title. You didn't even punch him.

Rashad Evans: Where is your belt? Where is your belt?

Rampage Jackson: You didn't even land a kick.

Rashad Evans: Where's your belt?

Rampage Jackson: You didn't land nothing.

Rashad Evans: Where's your belt?

Rampage Jackson: I got three of them homey. I got them.

Rashad Evans: You don't got one.

Rampage Jackson: I do. I got three. Where's your?

Rashad Evans: Shut the hell up you don't got a belt.

Rampage Jackson: I got three.

Rashad Evans: You don't got a belt.

Rampage Jackson: OK. You don't got nothing.

Rashad Evans: Hey, you don't got nothing either. So I guess we the same ain't we.

Rampage Jackson: No, we ain't.

Rashad Evans: Ignorant. Ignorant.

Rampage Jackson: Nowhere near the same. Nowhere near the same.

Rashad Evans: I know I'm better than you. I'm better than you, I'm sorry.

Rampage Jackson: Man, hey, I'm glad you think that. You can't do nothing better than me boy.

Rashad Evans: We'll, see.

Rampage Jackson: I know we are.

Rashad Evans: Hey. The best thing about this is we'll see in two weeks though. That's the best thing about all of this shit talking right now. Everything we saying right now the best thing about it we get to see in two weeks and I want you to show up and I want you to be your best.

Rampage Jackson: That's what I'm looking forward to it. I am going to be my best.

Rashad Evans: Please do, please do, please do. Let me know what I can do to help you be your best.

Rampage Jackson: You don't got a ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: Let me know what I can do to help you be your best.

Rampage Jackson: Just show up.

Rashad Evans: All right, that's it. I think you're going to need more than that bro. I guarantee you're going to need more than that.

Rampage Jackson: OK. All right, I'm glad. I'm glad you're feeling this way. I'm glad you're feeling that way.

Rashad Evans: Hey did you get that package I got for you ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: I don't even know what you're talking about.

Rashad Evans: Yes, I sent you something.

Rampage Jackson: I got two packages ((inaudible)). OK. Keep playing your little boy games.

Rashad Evans: All right, hey I ...

Rampage Jackson: I'm a grown ass man and you're playing these little boy games, I don't know what you're talking about.

Rashad Evans: Hey, hey...

Rampage Jackson: This is – hey at the end of the day May 29 you know you're getting your ass kicked.

Rashad Evans: Yes, yes, I know it. I know it.

Rampage Jackson: And all of this talking and all of this running around trying to pull up that black (comic) because I'm black I don't know what big words is. Hey I have my sense of humor, you have your weak ass sense of humor.

Rashad Evans: Quinton, Quinton, Quinton...

Rampage Jackson: You know what I'm saying ((inaudible)) and shit. You have your weak ass sense of humor, I got my sense of humor. Don't hit on me.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: Don't hit on me because you can't beat me and we all know you're trying to beat me.

Rashad Evans: Don't act like you're stupid, don't act like you're stupid.

Rampage Jackson: Hey, shut the hell up. Next question, man, next question, please. Anything to shut this guy up. Next question. He even talks when they're getting knocked out. Who talks when they're getting knocked out?

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: Who talks when they're getting knocked out? This guy even talks while he's getting knocked out. Who talks while they're getting knocked the hell out.

Rashad Evans: You know why because I got big balls that's when I talk when I'm about to get knocked out because I don't give a fuck that's why.

Rampage Jackson: No, you was talking while you were still knocked out.

Rashad Evans: It don't matter. It don't matter.

Rampage Jackson: Shut your mouth. Shut your mouth.

Rashad Evans: Hey, I got enough heart at least I won't quit. At least I won't quite like you did when you was going against Shogun.

Rampage Jackson: Oh yes, I ain't quitting.

Rashad Evans: Oh yes, yes, yes, you quit just laid there like a little sucker in the corner.

Rampage Jackson: All right.

Rashad Evans: Just holding your ribs talking about how my ribs hurt. Nothing was wrong with your ribs.

Rampage Jackson: All right, keep going on ...

Rashad Evans: You were just ...

Rampage Jackson: Keep going on these bad fights when I didn't even train keep going off those, please.

Rashad Evans: Hey, I'm going by your heart when you was in there.

Rampage Jackson: All right.

Rashad Evans: What about your heart?

Rampage Jackson: OK.

Rashad Evans: You ain't got no heart.

Rampage Jackson: All right, we'll see.

Rashad Evans: You're the fucking Tin Man.

Rampage Jackson: OK. We'll see. I'm glad you think that.

Rashad Evans: You're the Tin Man go see Oz. Go see the Oz.

Dana White: All right, next question.

Rampage Jackson: That's all you can do is talk. That's all he can do.

Dana White: Next question.

Operator: OK. We'll go next to Nicholas Cunningham, Hola America newspaper.

Nicholas Cunningham: Yes, my first question is actually for Dana. Did you have any thoughts of any other fights before putting this fight together?

Dana White: What do you mean?

Nicholas Cunningham: Just maybe giving Rampage maybe like a tune-up fight after...

Dana White: No, this was the fight.

Rampage Jackson: This is a tune-up fight. What the hell are you talking?

Rashad Evans: Yes, I'm glad you think so.

Nicholas Cunningham: OK.

Dana White: This was the fight. These guys both coached on the Ultimate Fighter. Not only do I think that you know everybody wants to see this fight I think they both want this fight real bad. If you can't tell that then I don't know what to say.

Nicholas Cunningham: Yes, OK. And then my question is for Rampage what kind of training did you do during the movie? And did you feel like you got enough during that?

Rampage Jackson: I trained as much as I could. I brought one of my teammates (Tom Blacklace) to come up there. He's real good at wrestling and jujitsu and muay thai and he (helped pass) for me. And you know I trained, I ran and I just did enough you know what I'm saying just to stay around, stay in the game.

Nicholas Cunningham: Right. OK. And then just last one for Rashad really quick, it looked like you upped your cardio a little bit for this fight just from watching the stuff on TV. Is that true?

Rashad Evans: Yes, I did a lot more you know because I kind of got tired in my last fight. And ...

Rampage Jackson: You get tired in all of your fights what are you talking about.

Rashad Evans: And I wanted to make sure I was in good shape the whole time. You know because I wanted to make sure I could go and do my game plan if I want to take him down 100 times, I can take him down 100 times and not get tired you know.

Nicholas Cunningham: OK. All right, thank you guys.

Rashad Evans: You stop interrupting a grown ass man when he's speaking. I will reach through the phone and kick the shit out of you.

Rampage Jackson: Yes, sir.

Operator: And we'll go next to George Willis, New York Post.

George Willis: Hello, gentlemen. Dana, when did you first get an inkling of the animosity between these two guys?

Dana White: The day they walked on the set. You know there was some back and forth with them after Rampage's fight but I didn't know it was going to be what it ended up being on the season of the Ultimate Fighter. I think it just sort of escalated. The first minute they walked on set it escalated from there.

George Willis: Why?

Dana White: They don't like each other.

George Willis: Rampage, could you give us the exact dates of your shooting the movie, how long ago was it, what were the dates where you working?

Rampage Jackson: Many, I don't know. I don't know. I don't know what day I graduated high school man. Don't ask me questions. I don't know nothing about that. I'm focused on this fight, man. I don't know nothing about no movies, dog.

George Willis: But it's been a while back, right, months.

Rampage Jackson: It's a long time ago.

Dana White: What was the month that he finished filming?

George Willis: About a year probably, maybe almost?

Dana White: It was in December. December he finished filming the movie.

George Willis: December, OK. Great. All right, that's all I got. Thanks.

Dana White: Thank you.

Operator: And we'll go next...

Rashad Evans: Hey Quinton, stop playing stupid all of the time. You know what days you finished doing a movie.

Rampage Jackson: OK.

Rashad Evans: Stop acting like you're stupid. You're smarter than that.

Operator: And we'll go next to John Oregan Fighters Only magazine.

John Oregan: Hi. The first question is for Dana. When Rampage first pulled out of the fight in Memphis I know that you were really mad about it and it kind of messed up your plans at the time. But now the fight's had a really long time to build. Obviously, there's a lot of hype building around it, a lot of animosity, are you kind of pleased with the way it's turned to really?

Dana White: Yes. You know it all did work out OK. And actually I just did an interview the other day talking about you know listen I'm in the fight business, this is what we do and especially coming off that season of the Ultimate Fighter, the way these two hated each other and the way the stuff went you know it was a huge blow the fight being in Memphis and everything else but the everything worked out.

And Quinton actually did a real movie. You know it's a real movie. It's going to be a huge hit this summer. And from what I hear he did really well in it. So he got to do a great movie. It's good for him. This thing worked out. The fight still happened. There's still a lot of build up. People still want to see this fight really bad so everything worked out.

John Oregan: Have you ever been on the conference call that's been as heated as this one?

Dana White: I don't think so. You know the reality is that these two really don't like each other. There's a lot of bad blood between these two and they really want to fight each other. And I think you know when you get two of the best in the world fighting each to her it's fun anyway but when they don't like each other this much it makes it a lot more fun.

Rampage Jackson: Rashad don't want to fight, he's just acting. That's just him putting up an act. He's going to run. He's going to try to do his little weak ass take downs. That boy don't want to fight. That boy do not want to fight, I guarantee you. All of this talking he's doing it ain't going to pay off. I guarantee you.

Rashad Evans: You want to fight? You want to fight? You want to fight like last time we were supposed to fight? You want to fight? Or you're going to call Dana next week and go Dana I can't do it man.

Rampage Jackson: I'm glad you're talking. I'm glad you're saying that we got Dana right here. Dana White when you called me right after that damn Wanderlei fight, was it the Wanderlei fight and you asked me to fight Rashad what did I say?

Dana White: You said yes.

Rampage Jackson: And then you called me back and said what right afterwards, why I ended up fighting Jardine? When you called me back what did you say Dana?

Dana White: I don't remember.

Rampage Jackson: You don't remember? You don't remember you said Rashad didn't take the fight because he wanted to take his belt longer. Do you remember when you called me and I told you – at first I told you no I didn't want to fight, it was right after my fight. Then you talked me into it. I said you have me I'm doing pushups right here in the parking lot.

Dana White: Right, right, I do remember that.

Rampage Jackson: You remember that. And you said all right the fight – and then you called Rashad and that was the first...

Dana White: Right.

Rampage Jackson: And that was the first time we heard about the fight you called Rashad. And it was right with his fight with Forrest.

Dana White: I don't remember why. Rashad why didn't you want to take that fight?

Rashad Evans: Because I just had a baby in November and I was in training camp and I didn't get to see my baby yet. That's what.

Rampage Jackson: OK. But now it comes out. You were the one who backed out of the fight first, bro?

Rashad Evans: OK. What happened to...

Rampage Jackson: Then when it comes to ...

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)). I had nothing to do with you.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: It had nothing to do with you. You didn't even a belt why did you want to fight
((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: You didn't even have a belt by that time.

Rashad Evans: Would you please tell me what happened before Jardine? What happened? What did
you say?

Rampage Jackson: What do mean happened? You didn't even have no belt bro.

Rashad Evans: I didn't have a belt.

Rampage Jackson: Why would I want to fight you?

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) Machida. I wanted to fight Machida. I wanted to fight Machida. I didn't
want to fight you. You don't even have no belt.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: Why do I get out of fighting somebody that had no belt?

Rashad Evans: After you fought Jardine I didn't have the belt? Is that what you mean to tell me?

Because if you're telling me then you're stupider – then you really are stupid because I had the belt. That was the fight, fighting Jardine was a fight ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: Oh yes, yes, yes, OK, now I remember that.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: Yes, and two weeks after I fight Jardine yes I didn't want to fight.

Rashad Evans: You didn't want to fight, did you?

Rampage Jackson: No. I didn't want to fight.

Rashad Evans: OK. OK. So now we're even then right. You had your reason, I have my reason.

Rampage Jackson: Well, you're the one that keep bringing it up bro. You're the one who backed out first.

Rashad Evans: You had your reason and I had my reason, right.

Rampage Jackson: You're the one who backed out first.

Rashad Evans: You had your reason and I had my reason, right.

Rampage Jackson: But you keep bringing it up like I'm scared of you or something.

Rashad Evans: You, listen to me ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: You keep sounding like I'm scared of you or something.

Rashad Evans: I didn't back down. I didn't back down in my hometown. In my hometown.

Rampage Jackson: Hey, take no notice me doing a movie has nothing to do with you, bro.

Rashad Evans: I will never turn down a fight in my hometown.

Rampage Jackson: Me doing a movie had nothing to do with you remember that.

Rashad Evans: In my hometown I would have never turned down a fight, that's all I'm say. That's all I'm saying.

Rampage Jackson: That's you. My hometown ain't – the A-team movie was bigger than me than a fight with you.

Rashad Evans: But go on that's you, that's you, that's what you do. Don't worry about.

Rampage Jackson: That's you. That's you. I ain't nothing like you.

Rashad Evans: I know you're not because I would have did the fight in my hometown.

Rampage Jackson: Yes, you go – hey listen you go on and be a fighter and open your own gym and be a coach and coach people for the rest of your life because you're a great coach. You go ahead and do that. That's not my path home so you go ahead and so that. I ain't nothing like you.

Rashad Evans: You do you.

Rampage Jackson: I know I do me.

Dana White: All right, next question. Next question.

Operator: OK. We'll go next to John Oregan, Fighter's Only magazine.

John Oregan: And we're back. A question for Rashad, just a moment ago, several times in the call, in fact, you've said to Rampage that he acts stupid because he's black or you think he acts stupid because he's black. The first time you said that I thought that reminded me of in the boxing when Mohammed Ali was basically accusing Joe Frazier of being like an Uncle Tom. That's quite a serious...

Rashad Evans: Well, he does his little Sambo thing, man. He does his little Sambo thing like he act like oh black-on-black crime, oh I'm stupid you can't use big words like that like he don't know what the fuck is going on, many, come on dude. I talked to this dude. This dude is pretty smart you know what I'm saying.

He knows what's going on. But he just doing oh it's comedy well why perpetuate the stereotype that you're stupid. You ain't stupid you know what I'm saying. Why perpetuate the stereotype that you can't think you know what I'm saying? You can't – you don't understand big words, you can't read. All of that stupid stuff, man.

Rampage Jackson: Hey, I never said all of that.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: But you know what that's another angle for you to go and try to talk some. Hey I do what I do you do what you do. Why you act all cocky and act all fake and be playing with your nipples and look all gay so why do you that? Why you go that way? Why do you portray the stereotype of a black gay man if you don't want to go anywhere, play with your nipples and act all gay and want to look tight, ((inaudible)) shorts, what do you do that stuff.

Rashad Evans: That's me. That's me. That's what I wear.

Rampage Jackson: Yes, yes, I know because you gay. You play with your nipples and that's why you and (Queen Mo) ((inaudible)) he got nipple rings and you play with your nipples.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)) I'm gay. I'm going to put my big balls right in your face.

Rampage Jackson: I bet you'll get a hard on from it too.

Rashad Evans: I probably would too but it would be OK because it'll be on your mouth.

Rampage Jackson: I know you gay ass.

Rashad Evans: It'll be OK because it will be right in your mouth so...

Rampage Jackson: Keep on, keep on Rashad. Keep on man.

Dana White: Next question.

Rampage Jackson: Keep on man.

Dana White: Next question.

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) my skin you made a big mistake, man.

Operator: And we'll go next to Dave Meltzer Yahoo Sports.

Dave Meltzer: Hey, Dana.

Rampage Jackson: I'm on the rampage, oh-oh Dana could you cancel the fight, fuck you, I don't care.

Dana White: Hello, go ahead, Dave.

Dave Meltzer: Hey, on this fight is there anything more – I noticed that like you know you got the theater (step) for 115 is there anything more like more extensive closed circuit or anything else that you're thinking of especially after this interview?

Dana White: No. Same as ever. It's – we're doing the theaters and all of the closed circuit that we normally do.

Dave Meltzer: No I mean as far as you're doing the theaters for the 115 for this fight. I mean is there anything new that's you know anything special that you're going to do for this one?

Dana White: No.

Dave Meltzer: OK. And is you know what 's kind of like your thought as far – I mean you wouldn't commit to the winner getting a title shot but I mean would you say that the winner is ...

Dana White: I did commit to the winner getting a title shot.

Dave Meltzer: Oh the winner is going to get a title shot.

Dana White: Yes.

Dave Meltzer: OK. I didn't know that. All right, OK. Cool. All right, thanks.

Dana White: Yes.

Operator: And we'll go next to Joshua Carey Bleacher Report.

Joshua Carey: Yes, first question is for Rampage, Rampage with Bisping being on this card as well now being bumped up to the co-main event what's it been like having him? I know that you always have him in your camps with him actually being in this camp and fighting on the same card and the same night as yourself? How big of a boost has that been for not only yourself but maybe for him as well?

Rampage Jackson: Well you know it's been good. Bisping is an excellent training partner, excellent sparring partner you know what I'm saying. He press the pace a lot and he's just a good guy to have in camp you know to keep things positive and the way I like to train you know what I'm saying. We laugh and but we keep to work and work hard.

Joshua Carey: OK. Great. Thanks, Rampage. Next question is for Dana. Whenever Forrest had to pull out against Little Nog, was the Bisping fight was that the fight that made the most sense to be bumped to the main event status?

Dana White: Well, Little Nog is still fighting. Little Nog is still in the show.

Joshua Carey: Yes, I just mean what is it you know with Forrest and Little Nog you know originally being as the co-main event was the Bisping the fight that made the most sense obviously to be bumped up to the co-main event status?

Dana White: Yes, it did but there's a lot good fights on that card. So it's never easy who you're going to put in that second slot, but yes, Bisping made sense.

Joshua Carey: Yes, absolutely. And then the final question here for Rashad and I'll let the other guys get their questions in. Now, Rashad you brought in a lot of different people for this camp and obviously you travel around and go up to Colorado with Shane Carwin and those guys. But you brought in King Mo for this fight, what was the reasoning for bringing him in? Is it trying to attempt to – for him to simulate what Rampage does? Or is that just a connection that you all ready had?

Rashad Evans: It was a connection I all ready had. Me and Mo have been cool since college, but you know one thing he do – he do a good Rampage. And at that same time he help me work on my takedown. You know he got the best takedowns in the game. He's got the best wrestling so I've been working with him.

Joshua Carey: OK. Great. Thanks, guys. I appreciate the answers and have a good day.

Dana White: Thank you.

Operator: And once again, ladies and gentlemen, to signal for a question, that is star 1. We'll go next to Neil Davidson, the Canadian Press.

Neil Davidson: Yes. Rashad, given the bad blood that's certainly been evidenced on today's call is there any concern that come fight night you're just going to get in the cage and see red? Or do you think you'll be able to stick to the game plan and stay cool?

Rashad Evans: I'm going to stay cool, man you know what I'm saying despite how hot me make man I'll be able to stay cool. You know that's one thing I think my corner is going to do a real job of just keeping me focused and dialed in you know what I'm saying.

I do want to go out dangerous and just start you know what I'm saying just start throwing punching at him and just seeing where they land but at the same time I know there's a strategy involved so I've got to stick to the strategy.

Neil Davidson: And Rampage, what about you? Any concerns that you might lose your cool?

Rampage Jackson: Ain't no concerns about me losing my cool, bro because you know what I'm saying I don't worry about that type stuff. That be the last thing on my mind. That's the last thing on my mind losing my cool.

Neil Davidson: OK. Good luck to you both.

Dana White: Thanks, Neil.

Operator: And we'll go next to Beau Dure, U.S.A Today.

Beau Dure: Yes, I wanted to ask Dana about all of this. I mean you know you've taken a lot of steps with the organization in your what 9 years now and you know making it more like sport and less spectacle, I suppose, and I mean not that you don't have spectacle in the shows, but you generally don't go in for kind of wrestling type theatrics and stuff like this.

Do you feel like you're sort of you have to walk a line here when you have two guys yelling at each other talking over each other and some sort of racial and even sexual stuff going on?

Dana White: Not at all. Listen, the way that I see it is these kind of fights happen every once in a while and this is a sport but don't ever fool yourself. This is a fight game you know. And sometimes the guys who fight each other don't like each other and these two don't and it is what it is.

Beau Dure: So is it at least better than guys from the same camp who don't want to fight each other at all?

Dana White: The me – the WWE stuff is the guys who are out there you know hyping it up and trying to make it look that way. These guys don't like each other. This is – it doesn't get any more real than this. It's – it's a fight and these two guys that are fighting don't like each other. And I think people enjoy that and have fun when two guys genuinely want to fight each other.

Beau Dure: Do you sometimes feel like though that you know maybe deep down, I don't know, Rashad actually likes Rampage, or just wants to get into his head?

Dana White: No, I think that, to be honest with you you know and they'll both probably deny it right now, or maybe they won't, I don't know, I think they both respect each other in ways, but they just don't like each other. Listen, you can respect a guy's game, and his fighting style, and you know what he's going to bring to the table that night, doesn't mean you have to like him though.

Beau Dure: So are you not expecting a post-fight hug after this one?

Dana White: You never know. You know these guys could – I'm not expecting a post-fight punch. That's what I'm not expecting.

Beau Dure: Right. I take it you'd suspend someone who did that again?

Dana White: Right.

Beau Dure: Yes.

Dana White: Listen, these guys – who knows? When this fight's over, they might squash this. When this fight's over, they might still hate each other. You never know how that's going to until after the fight.

Beau Dure: All right. Thanks a lot.

Operator: And we'll go next to Chris Pappas, Fox 17, Nashville.

Chris Pappas: This question's for Dana. Dana, if Rampage wins, do you think you'll give him – give him another chance to bring the fight back at Tennessee for a title shot?

Dana White: I don't know. You know the whole – you know this is all based on schedule and everything else. I don't know. No. I don't – I have no clue. Couldn't even think about answering that question.

Chris Pappas: Thanks, Dana.

Dana White: Yes.

Operator: And we'll go next to Dave Diebert, Canwest News Service.

Dave Diebert: Hi. I got one just for the fighters. Right from the start, this one has had a lot of personal animosity there, but with a title fight on the line, now there's a lot of business to be pegged business side, to be taken care of, anyway. Does that add anything more to the fight?

I don't know, Rashad, can you take that one first?

Rashad Evans: I mean, it do add a little more, just as far as you know all the hype and just the mental energy you got to put into it. But at the same time you know you do got to remember that you're training for a fight, and you can't get ahead of yourself and over-train, just because you don't like the person. You know what I'm saying? You got to really be disciplined about that you know pulling back when you need to pull back.

But you know it's been kind of fun, to be honest you know because every time I find myself not wanting to do something, I just think of something that he said, I'm just like oh, yeah you know what I'm saying? Then it just give me the extra little push. But besides that, that's about it.

Dave Diebert: All right. Quinton? Does title shot add anything more to it for you?

Rampage Jackson: Well the title shot is kind of weird, because that it come about that is if the winner get a title shot, because I've been training like for this fight like it was the title shot. I've been training five rounds, so you know it's I still feel like I'm champion in my mind, so it for it to be a title shot next just makes it sweet. So I you know what I'm saying, I'll just go right into it and keep training those five rounds and get my belt back, get back on the right track of being one of the best fighters in the world.

Dave Diebert: All right. Well thanks you guys.

Operator: And we'll go next to Scott Fyfe, Sunday Post Scotland.

Scott Fyfe: Hi, thanks. Dana, thanks for being on the call. I wanted to ask you if Michael Bisping's performance on the 29th is crucial to Britain maintaining its current high profile in UFC?

Dana White: No, not at all. You know Michael Bisping obviously became a big star over in the U.K. There's a lot of good talent coming out of there now. There's a lot of good talent coming from all over the world, as this sport continues to grow. You know the answer's no.

Scott Fyfe: Do you, looking at the Hardy and Daley results, recently, is there any sense that you may have put them in too soon to the high profile fights they had, judging by their performances?

Dana White: Not at all.

Scott Fyfe: Right.

Dana White: I don't think Daley – I don't think Daley looked bad at all, and I think Hardy came off great. You know don't forget you know Dan Hardy fought Georges St. Pierre, who's been in this sport for a long time, and is you know is a world-champion and pound-for-pound one of the best in the world. I don't think you – he got in there too soon at all.

Scott Fyfe: Thanks, Dana.

Dana White: Thank you.

Scott Fyfe: Quint – thanks. Quinton, I wanted to ask, have you noticed an urgency about Michael, based on the – his last two disappointing results in this camp, or is he still exactly the same in your eyes?

Rampage Jackson: Michael always works hard in his training camps, but this one, you noticing, I can – I can tell you know he has like a fire up under his ass. He's working extra hard. And he's you know what I'm saying, beating the hell out of people you know what I'm saying. And he actually you know what I'm saying, hurt one of his sparring partners last night you know what I'm saying. We sharing sparring partners right now, and you know what I'm saying, we taking them out. And he's taking them out just as much I'm taking them out.

It was like, whoa, we got to – we got to buy new sparring partners. We buying them – we buying them but we hurting them and throwing them out, get new ones.

Rashad Evans: He did take out one – a sparring partner, (when he all), like 155 (part) of the (duges) beating up on the countdown show. How ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: Yes, I like – I like the speed. I like ...

Rashad Evans: ... like 170, right? ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: ... I like the little guys – I like the little guys for the speed.

Rashad Evans: ... you taught a (Shawn) on that little dude on the countdown show, on primetime show.

Rampage Jackson: Yes. I like the little dudes with the speed.

Rashad Evans: That's who you training with. ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: So you fancy yourself to be a fast guy, so ...

Rashad Evans: You training with a 170 pounders?

Rampage Jackson: ... I do what I do ...

Rashad Evans: Come on, dude.

Rampage Jackson: Yes. Yes. He probably – he probably like a 40 pounder, I don't know how – I don't know how small he is ...

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: ... but homeboy was saying it though ...

Rashad Evans: So as he – as he ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: ... homeboy – homeboy was saying it though.

Rashad Evans: ... did something though, after you drop him, he act like you really did something.

Rampage Jackson: Hey. All I got to say, a guy like you with a glass jaw shouldn't be talking as much as you talk homey.

Rashad Evans: When? You ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: That's all I got to say. So don't worry about ((inaudible)) my sparring partner.

Rashad Evans: Your last fight against ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) big or small my sparring partners are. You go – you think we going to show you everything on a primetime show ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)) him out. I recall you getting caught with a straight right hand, going against the ...

Rampage Jackson: OK.

Rashad Evans: ... going against the cage, and being rocked. I remember that. And I know you remember that.

Rampage Jackson: OK. OK.

Rashad Evans: You remember that? Have you ever been rocked ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: But did you do it?

Rashad Evans: ... have you ever been knocked out?

Rampage Jackson: But did you do it?

Rashad Evans: So dude, you got a glass jaw.

Rampage Jackson: But did you do it.

Rashad Evans: So you got a glass jaw?

Rampage Jackson: But did – but did you do it, though?

Rashad Evans: No, I'm saying, do you got a glass jaw?

Rampage Jackson: But did you – but did you do it?

Rashad Evans: I'm saying you said I got a glass jaw.

Rampage Jackson: Did you do it?

Rashad Evans: I said ((inaudible)) ...

Rampage Jackson: Oh, ((inaudible)) jaw before Jardine ...

Rashad Evans: No.

Rampage Jackson: ... my jaw was – my jaw was messed up, but now it's good, homey.

Rashad Evans: Oh, OK. OK.

Rampage Jackson: I mean, yes, to be honest.

Rashad Evans: I was just saying that ...

Rampage Jackson: Yes.

Rashad Evans: ... because you said I got a glass jaw, but I remember your last fight ...

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) Ramirez ...

Rashad Evans: ... you got rocked too. I was just saying ...

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) injured my jaw before my ((inaudible)) fight.

Rashad Evans: I was just saying. Hey ...

Rampage Jackson: What's going to be your excuse, though? What's going to be your excuse?

Rashad Evans: I was just saying, you said I got a glass jaw ...

Rampage Jackson: Hey, I saw – hey, I saw you get punched ...

Rashad Evans: ... ((inaudible)) rocked your last fight ...

Rampage Jackson: ... what? I saw you get punched like a little chick by (Seela) and you had like rubber legs. You was on queer street for a long time.

Rashad Evans: You had rubber legs when you got hit by Jardine.

Rampage Jackson: No, I don't remember that, homey. I don't remember no rubber legs.

Rashad Evans: You don't remember that?

Rampage Jackson: Not like you.

Rashad Evans: You don't remember that? You don't remember that?

Rampage Jackson: You all took two minutes to recover, (Homey).

Rashad Evans: You don't remember going against the cage? You don't remember going against the cage?

Rampage Jackson: All right. It's all we've got...

Rashad Evans: You don't remember that?

Rampage Jackson: ...no, I don't remember the (road lays) except what you had (on the still). You had the (road lays).

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: I want to (set this) with everybody. I wasn't (showing anybody) still (outlasting the whole). The whole place fell down laughing, Dog. You were laying there like (donkey land).

Rashad Evans: (They laughed at you).

Rampage Jackson: No. You got hurt (quick going) on in your body, baby. You was jiggling, Dog. You had – you were getting (teeny weeny).

Rashad Evans: (I was, right)?

Rampage Jackson: Like you were dead. You were (jiggling). ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: I won, though, right?

Rampage Jackson: You didn't know what you were going to do. I heard you crapped yourself that day.

Rashad Evans: Did I win? Did I win? Did I win?

Rampage Jackson: I wouldn't call it no win. I wouldn't call it no win. All you did was took a (bow). You didn't do no take downs. I wouldn't have called it no win. All right, it's a win (by default probably). (It's not a win by myself).

Rashad Evans: How about that (fight against Jardino)? How...

Rampage Jackson: You treat me like that. You take a risk on something like that.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) wins like that, but you had to do the wins (to old Jardino). You (had the wins you've over bids being). How did you (treat) those little wins like that? ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: That was the worst part of it. That was the worst part of it.

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)). It was like you had it with those wins right there. For you to say that Forrest beat me. You don't know no nothing about the sport you know what I'm saying for you to say ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)) knocked two times ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)).

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)) two times.

Rampage Jackson: ((inaudible)) but he beat you.

Rashad Evans: You hit him on the jaw ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: You don't do nothing Rashad. You don't do nothing.

Rashad Evans: Hey did (Forest) beat you?

Male: Next question, next question.

Rampage Jackson: No he didn't beat me. I beat myself. You weak, (Rashad) and you know.

Male: Next question.

Rampage Jackson: You weak boy.

Operator: And we'll go next to Steven Morrocco, MMA Junkie.com.

Steven Morrocco: Hey, Rampage. This questions is for Rampage. Do you remember when you met Rashad and when this all started, when you all – when you thought to yourself I don't like this guy?

Rampage Jackson: Well I met Rashad back in the day when he was fighting at Gladiator Challenge and he fought my boy ((inaudible)) Hector Ramirez and Hector broke his ankle in the cage and Rashad was still dancing around playing with his nipples back then with them little tight shorts on acting like he was doing something.

Rashad was like whoa, and then he come asking me hey man I want to come train with you. I thought it was real disrespectful because he just fought my teammate in the tournament and he like disrespected him by talking about his wrestling and dancing around and stuff like that.

I said man I don't want to train with you, man. You just fought my teammate. And then – but I never had nothing personal with him. You know what I'm saying. I was fighting the ((inaudible)) back then.

You know I had never thought nothing of him. You know what I'm saying. I thought he was you know a good wrestler and stuff back then but you know what I'm saying I just didn't like his style. And then everything was cool until he got in my face after the Jardine fight.

You know what I'm saying, he real cocky. He figures he got the belt you know what I'm saying. He the man you know what I'm saying. He done knocked out Chuck and then he knocked out this other fat guy with a head kick. So he feels like he the man.

His head is bigger than a hot air balloon. So I'm like this guy come in the cage after I just did my job and fight his teammate and he was supposed to be one the one in the cage. And then I watch the pay per view and he commented my fight talking about bad about the whole time I'm fighting.

I'm like oh this guy got some nerve ...

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)).

Rampage Jackson: And that's when I stopped liking him right then and there. I didn't want to have nothing else to do with him.

Steven Morocco: OK and then jumping forward a little bit if this movie is a big hit, if the A-Team is a big hit like Dana says it might be how do you plan to manage both a movie career and a career being you know a top UFC fighter?

Rampage Jackson: Well you know I'll cross that bridge when I come to it you know what I'm saying. It was my dream to be affiliated with the A-Team. And you know what I'm saying I accomplished that now if they do a sequel and stuff like that you know what I'm saying I'm happy with doing what I did you know what I'm saying.

But I ain't never lied about you know what I'm saying why I do the things I do. I fight for money and I work. You know what I'm saying it's my job. So I'm all about making the most as I can make. You know what I'm saying, save up for my future so whatever's bringing in the most cash that's where my ass will be at. That's real.

Steven Morocco: And Dana do you anticipate if the movie is a big hit that's it's going to be a little bit more difficult to schedule Rampage and sort of get him in for you?

Dana White: I think it's next to impossible for this movie not to be a big hit. I don't know now if you've seen the trailer for it but it's a good movie. There's big stars in it, it's a real movie and like Rampage said I'll cross that bridge when I get to it.

Steve Morocco: Have these guys eclipsed Ken and Tito do you think?

Dana White: What's that?

Steven Morocco: Have these guys eclipsed Ken and Tito you think?

Dana White: I think these two have eclipsed any grudge match we've ever had. You can tell this is genuine and these guys really don't like each other and they really want to fight. I don't think anybody can say that these guys are putting on an act even though Rampage is now an actor.

If you can't – they're definitely not acting.

Steven Morocco: OK, thanks guys.

Dana White: Thank you.

Operator: And once again if you would like to signal for a question it is star one on your touchtone telephone.

Dana White: We'll take two more questions.

Operator: And we'll go next to Anthony Springer, fightnews.com.

Anthony Springer: Hi, this first question is for Rashad. Looking back at your career, you've beaten everybody that's fought Keith Jardine previously. Does – is it a confidence builder or does it give you an advantage going into camps when you face guys that Jardine has also fought?

Rashad Evans: You know part of the reason why I probably beat a lot of guys that Jardine faces because you know we had a chance to go at them one time before in training camp. And most of the time I was studying the partner, studying the person that I was going to fight you know Jardine was going to fight.

So I pretty got a good idea how they are. You know what I'm saying? When Jardine was fighting Quinton I was intending to beat Quinton. So I know Quinton his whole style. You know what I'm

saying, I know his footwork. You know what I'm saying? When he rolls, when he's not going to roll what he's looking for. I know all that just by you know what I'm saying by watching him and scouting him when I was doing for Jardine.

Anthony Springer: Absolutely. And this next question is for Rampage. Given that Dana White has already said that the winner of this bout gets a title shot and Shogun has just got the belt from Machida and that's somebody that you've lost to previously. Does that give you any extra motivation going into this?

Rampage Jackson: Man, I see like the universe has opened up for me right now. It seems like it's my time. So that Shogun fight actually does (haunt) me – (haunt) me ever since then. You know what I'm saying? I never even should of – I never even should of took the fight. I went into the fight already injured, and it's one of those things and it taught me a mean lesson. You know what I'm saying?

Back in the day I was young. I was a kid full of myself. I felt like oh Shogun ain't fought nobody. He can't hurt me. I can still take this fight even though I'm injured you know what I'm saying, because I was all about making that money. You know what I'm saying?

And it end up costing me. And even now I hear Rashad talking bad about it. It makes me – makes me I can't even explain it how that make me feel it's like it makes me want to like put a hurting on Rashad then go putting a hurting on Shogun, right? I'm so fired up and so motivated. You know what I'm saying?

If I got a – if I got a you know what I'm saying put Rashad face in mud to get back to that – to those nightmares I have man, so be it man it's on – it's on and popping. You know what I'm saying? You guys – you guys are going to see a brand new Rampage.

I've trained 13 long weeks for this fight. This is the longest training camp I ever had. And for Rashad to think that he's going to fight the same guy that he was having Jardine for you know what I'm saying more power to him then. And all the stuff he did mimic me for Jardine. It didn't help Jardine and it ain't going to help him.

Rashad Evans: It (didn't) help Jardine he almost knocked your ass out in the second round. What you talking about?

Rampage Jackson: OK. That's your point.

Rashad Evans: He is – had no ...

Rampage Jackson: Hey, that's your boyfriend. You going to say something like that so ...

Rashad Evans: Had not you got caught with that left punch he would have won the fight.

Rampage Jackson: OK.

Rashad Evans: ((inaudible)) last punch he would have won that fight by the way.

Rampage Jackson: OK. All right.

Rashad Evans: Just so you know – just so you know.

Rampage Jackson: OK, OK.

Rashad Evans: Go on, go on, go on now.

Rampage Jackson: If you were judging the fight ...

Rashad Evans: No, that's how the judges had it.

Dana White: Go ahead.

Anthony Springer: One follow-up on that for Rampage because you mentioned that you kind of took Shogun a little lightly. And on the one hand you say that Rashad hasn't done anything in the sport. What is – what is – but you're also motivated for this fight. What is keeping you from underestimating Rashad?

Rampage Jackson: Oh no, I'm not underestimating Rashad at all. You know what I'm saying? He's got fast punches and he got a pretty good takedown. You know what I'm saying? But you know I'm not underestimating him at all. You know what I'm saying? This is going to be a really good fight for me. This is going to be a really good test for me.

And I'm not underestimating anybody else. I learn that from Forrest. I underestimated Forrest. I didn't train properly for him and know what I'm saying was way over weight and just didn't do things right. You know what I'm saying?

So I learned my lesson over and over again. But you know what I'm saying? Things like that would prepare me for days like this when you really – when it really counts. You know what I'm saying?

And I think everything happens for a reason. You know what I'm saying? I lost that fight to Forrest. I beat myself. I didn't train hard, but for this fight I trained the hardest I ever trained. You know what I'm saying?

At first I thought when I trained for Wanderlei I thought that hardest. I thought – I thought I didn't say I could train harder than that, but for this fight I pushed myself to the limit. I pushed myself to the limit. I never trained this hard in my whole fighting career.

And I'm very – and I'm very proud of myself because let it be known win, lose or draw on May 29 I'm proud of myself because I'm not known to be a guy to be good in the gym. You know what I'm saying?

When I trained normally I suck in the gym and I'm – and I'm good on the night. But this time I've actually been good in gym which is going to make me even better on the night. So I'm already proud of myself. I already – I feel like I'm already – I already won, the fight's already mine. So the hardest thing is always the training for me basically anyway and I've been doing great in training.

Anthony Springer: Thank you, that's my final question.

Dana White: All right. We got one more question.

Operator: And we'll go next to Leif Knutson, FOX, Twin Cities.

Leif Knutson: All right, guys you know you have so much animosity towards each other you know the jawing doesn't seem to stop. After this fight do you think that's really going put that on ice or is it going to be more well, I'll get you next time and back at it again?

Rashad Evans: No you know what for me? I mean you know you always got to respect somebody you fight when you go in there and you fight and you give it all you got you know what I'm saying, you kind of exchange something with the person you fight. You know what I'm saying? And you kind

of – you kind of leave your spirit on them a little bit and that's something you can always respect.

You know what I'm saying?

Like, before you know what I'm saying I met Quinton in Gladiator Challenge he was my favorite fighter. You know what I'm saying? So I have – he was my dude. You know he really was one of the dudes. I was, like, man I want to start getting into fighting because at the time I was wrestling in college. You know? But when he got his ass (whipped) by Wanderlei that kind of crushed me. But you know what I'm saying? But still you know what I'm saying he was still my dude.

So I don't think that you know what I'm saying I'll be like oh man, I hate his ass. I don't like him and I'll never like him. You know what I'm saying? I'm sure we'll probably – if he whooped me or I whoop him I'm sure we'll probably fight again, and we'll probably pick up right where we left off. But for the most part after the fight it's over you know what I'm saying we'll probably be cool for a minute.

Leif Knutson: What do you think about that Rampage?

Rampage Jackson: I'm a grown ass man. This is a sport to me this is how – this is how – this is how I get paid. But this is the first time I'm actually going to enjoy beating the hell out of somebody. You know what I'm saying?

Leif Knutson: Sure. And Dana, would you be open to a trilogy probably very likely with all this build up?

Dana White: It depends on the fight. You never talk about a trilogy unless – it depends on the fight. You know what I mean? If you look at all the guys that fight each other all the time and any trilogy that's ever been done have been wars, guys that have just gone back and forth in absolute dog fights, so you know it's hard to say.
